Board Approves Budget for Fiscal Year 2011-12 with No New Special Taxes

The \$12.8 million operating budget for FY2011-12 approved by the Village Board at their April 19 meeting, reflects an increase of \$330,000 or 2.6% over FY2010-11. The operating budget includes revenues and expenditures in the Village's General, Water and Sanitary Sewer Funds with revenues estimated at \$11.7 million and expenditures projected to be \$12.8 million. It also reflects a 0.8% increase in salary expenditures, a 2.3% increase in all other operating expenses and a 6.7% increase in benefit costs. The Village's General Fund is balanced meeting an important Board goal and includes no new special taxes as permitted under home rule authority or fees and fines except for water and sewer rates. At the same time, the General Fund balance of \$5.5 million maintains almost seven months of operating expenditures, exceeding the Village Board's objective of six months of reserves.

FY2009-10 Capital Budget

The Capital Budget for FY2011-12 reflects a total of \$1.9 million in expenditures including \$700,000 for projects related to water, \$277,000 budgeted in the sanitary sewer fund for slip lining projects and the remaining for equipment replacement and miscellaneous projects. The Capital Budget continues to reflect the Village's efforts to replace aging infrastructure for the safety and well being of residents.

Water and Sewer Rate Increases Effective May 1

As noted in the March-April Northfield News, effective May 1, 2011 a 7.5% water rate increase and a 10% sanitary sewer rate increase went into effect. These increases approved by the Board in December 2010, are needed to maintain and update the systems' infrastructure as well as cover the wholesale price increase of water passed on by the Village of Winnetka for fiscal year 2011-12. For each 100 cubic feet of water billed in each quarter annual period on or after May 1, the rate is now \$4.68 with a minimum water charge of \$51.48 for each quarter where the volume is equal to or less than 1,100 cubic feet. The sanitary sewer rate is \$1.66 per 100 cubic feet billed and the minimum water and sewer charge is \$69.74 per quarter where the volume is equal to or less than 1,100 cubic feet of water. Residents with sewer service only are billed \$96.41 for each quarter annual period billed May 1 or after.

Arbor Day 2011 Celebrated with District 29 4th Grade Students and Planting of Kentucky Coffeetree

Fourth grade students and teachers from Sunset Ridge Dist. 29 along with parents, grandparents, residents, Village President Fred Gougler, Police Chief Bill Lustig, Chief Michael Nystrand, Public Works employees and Northfield Park District representatives gathered at Clarkson Park on Friday, April 29, to celebrate Arbor Day 2011. President Gougler read the Arbor Day proclamation and students took turns shoveling dirt to cover the roots of the new Kentucky Coffeetree planted in honor of Arbor Day and to mark Northfield's 26th year as a Tree City USA. A special dedication of the tree was made to long-time Village employee Dave Zare for his 31 years of service to the Village and his interest and efforts on behalf of Arbor Day throughout the years. Vehicle Stickers (Cont'd from Pg. 1)

8:00 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Mon. - Fri. **Stickers must be displayed by July 1, 2011.** Vehicles required to be registered and the appropriate fees for stickers/tags are as follows: Passenger Cars - \$50; Motorcycles - \$35; Recreational Vehicles - \$60; Antique Cars - \$20; Trailers - \$20-\$75; Trucks by class - \$60-\$120; Replacement sticker - \$10. A penalty of 50% of the license fee will be added to the cost of any vehicle sticker purchased after July 1. For Senior residents (65 years and older) who participate in the State's Circuit Breaker Program requiring an income of less than \$36,635 for couples and \$27,610 for single seniors, one vehicle sticker per household is available at a 50% discount. Northfield stickers are displayed in the lower left hand corner of the front window (driver's side) of each vehicle including passenger vehicles, rv's and trucks. Tags are used for motorcycles and trailers. The Village will use State of Illinois vehicle registration information to ensure compliance. **Avoid a late payment penalty or citation by purchasing a sticker for each vehicle by July 1.**

North Shore Senior Center Celebrates 20th Year in the Community

In 1991, the North Shore Senior Center moved from the Winnetka Community House where the not-for-profit senior resource began in 1956. It was looking for more space and found it in the New Trier West building on Happ Road. The Center moved again in 2001 when the high school decided to reopen the west campus to freshmen students. The North Shore Senior Center established its own home at 161 Northfield Road which came to be known as the Arthur C. Nielsen Jr. Campus. In 2003, its House of Welcome, an adult day program for persons with Alzheimer's Disease, consolidated locations and came to Northfield as well. Today, the Center not only offers classes and day trips but also provides a wide array of social services in coordination with some State and Federal programs. The Senior Center's facilities include classrooms, cafe, fitness center, computer learning center, art studio, art gallery, lending library and a 250-seat auditorium. Public Works Dept. Begins Hydrant Flushing in May

The Village Public Works staff will be opening and flushing hydrants to remove accumulated sediment and improve water flow during the month of May as part of its annual fire hydrant and watermain maintenance program. Hydrant flushing will be done during the hours of 7 a.m. and 5 p.m. and can cause discoloration of water. Residents should run their **cold** water until it is clear. Those with questions or needing additional information, contact the Public Works Dept., 847-441-3810 between 8 a.m. and 4 p.m.

To prevent cutting utility wires, call J.U.L.I.E. (1-800-892-0123) at least 48 hours (not including weekends and holidays) before you or your contractor start to dig. J.U.L.I.E. is a free Illinois one-call system for locating underground utilities.

One-Time Dog, Cat and Horse Registration Makes Process Easy and Protects Pets

The Village's pet registration program requires owners of dogs and cats that are over six months of age to register them with the Village one time during the life of the pet. Residents can download the form via Internet www.northfieldil.org under Finance, call 847-446-9200, or fax 847-446-4670 to obtain a form from the Village Hall. The completed form along with proof of rabies inoculation for each dog and/or cat and a fee of \$25 per dog/cat can be mailed or brought to the Village Hall, 361 Happ, between 8:00 a.m. and 4:30 p.m. Monday through Friday. A metal I.D. tag with the pet's name, registration number, owner's address and telephone number will be mailed within 2 to 3 weeks. Horses are also required to be registered. The one-time fee is \$25. Registration of dogs and cats aids in their return if lost or stolen. Ask your veterinarian about having your pets "microchipped." Also, to protect your pets, keep cats indoors and all dogs on a leash. **County and State laws require proof of current rabies shots and a tag for all dogs and cats.**

Replace Worn or Torn Flags and Dispose of Old Flags in the Proper Way

The New Trier Veterans of Foreign Wars has set up local receptacles for the proper disposal of worn or torn American flags. Drop your worn flags into the white receptable outside the Northfield Fire-Rescue Station, 1800 Winnetka Avenue. Collected flags will be properly burned with honor at a VFW ceremony.

Block Parties

To hold a block party, write the Village Manager at least one week prior to the event including the street, date, time, area to be closed and a raindate. Public Works will be notified to deliver barricades a day before the event.

IDOT Hosts Public Meeting May 16 to Review Progress on Willow Road Discussions

The Illinois Dept. of Transportation (IDOT) invites Northfield residents to the second Open House Public Meeting to review the progress on the Context Sensitive Solutions (CSS) process involving improvements to Willow Road from Waukegan Road to the Edens Expressway. The Open House will be held on Monday, May 16, from 5 to 8 p.m. at New Trier High School West, 7 Happ Road, in the Main Cafeteria, Bldg. C in Northfield. There will be exhibits and an audio-visual presentation shown every 20 minutes. IDOT representatives and project team members will be present to answer questions regarding the project and court reporters will accept oral comments. Also, written comments will be accepted at the meeting or can be submitted for two weeks following the meeting, to May 31, through the project website, www.willowroadfuture.org.

Winnetka Road Resurfacing to begin May 31 - Expect Lane Closures and Detours

Cook County Highway Dept. will begin milling and resurfacing of Winnetka Road from Mickey Lane on the west to West Frontage Road at the east end beginning Monday, May 31. The project, which is expected to be complete by mid-August, will include milling of the existing surface, sub-base patches, adjustment of existing structures, removal and replacement of some curb and gutter and resurfacing and pavement markings. Daily lane closures with traffic control is expected to cause delays and motorists are advised to use alternate routes.

Keep Rivers and Ditches Free of Debris to Prevent Flooding in Your Area

To prevent blockages and flooding in river areas, do not to throw debris and/or landscape waste into the river. After storms, residents along the river should check for fallen trees in the river and report them to the Public Works Dept., 847-441-3810.

Doing Our Part to Be Green and Clean by Reducing, Reusing and Recycling

Northfield Twp. Hosts Weekday Recycling Events Monday-Friday from 7 AM to 3 PM

The Northfield Township Road District is accepting recycled items Mondays through Fridays from 7:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. at the Road District garage, 1928 Lehigh Avenue in Glenview through November 4, 2011. Items accepted include: art supplies, batteries, bikes and toys (in usable condition), cell phones, pagers, clothing (in usable condition), computers and computer hardware, electronics, engine oil, eyeglasses, flags, household paint (oil and latex - limited to 10 1-gallon cans or 2-5-gallon buckets, hydraulic oil, ink/toner cartridges, metal, paper, Styrofoam, televisions, therapeutic equipment including canes, crutches, standers, walkers and wheelchairs, tires, and transmission fluid. The Twp, Road District works with Abt Electronics, St. Philip Lutheran Church, Village Treasure House, The Resale Shop at Glenview Community, OLPH, WINGS Resale Stores, CEDA, the Salvation Army and the City of Chicago/Illinois Environmental Protection Agency (IEPA) to distribute recycled items for reuse. **Items NOT accepted** include household hazardous waste including antifreeze, brake fluid, cleaning products, commercial/ industrial waste, drain cleaners, explosives, fertilizers, fire extinguishers, flares, gasoline, landscape waste, lawn chemicals, medical waste, oil mixed with other fluids, pesticides, propane tanks, radioactive material, sharps and/or pharmaceuticals, stains and varnishes with a mineral spirit base, used gas cans or any fluid not in its original container. Village Partners with Township to Offer Shredding Event May 14 from 9 AM to 1 PM across from New Trier High School West

The Village of Northfield is partnering with Northfield Twp. to hold a "Shredding Event" on Saturday, May 14 from 9:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m. at the south end of the parking lot across from New Trier West High School (adjacent to where the Farmers Market is held). Residents are allowed a maximum of three (3) containers, banker-size boxes, or bags of paper to be shredded and should take their empty containers with them. Residents can view their documents being shredded via the monitor on the outside of the truck. *If you can volunteer to help people take paper to be shredded out of their vehicle on May 14, contact the Village Hall, 847-446-9200 x2231. High School students and boy/girl scouts welcome.*

Village Wide Clean-Up Day is Saturday, May 14 - All Items at the Curb by 7 AM

Residents can get rid of old or unused items that cannot be recycled from closets, basements, attics and garages on Saturday, May 14 during the annual Village Wide Clean-Up Day. All items must be put at the curb by 7:00 AM that day for pick up by Waste Management. NO hazardous waste, construction debris, landscape or regular waste or "white goods" (appliances including stoves, refrigerators, washers, dryers, etc.) will be picked up. To arrange for a special pick up of "white goods," call Waste Management, 1-800-796-9696. Abt also recycles old appliances at their recycling center, a free-standing building west of the main Abt store on Milwaukee Avenue in Glenview, from 2:00 to 7:00 p.m. Thursdays through Saturdays. Ways to Reduce Your Use

Rent! If you only need something occasionally, rent it. You won't have to store it or maintain it and it will work when you need it.

Donate! Charities are always looking for unwanted but still usable items such as clothes, eyeglasses, furniture and other household items.

Share! Trade books, magazines and newspapers with friends, relatives and co-workers or use the library. Share rides to save energy.

Let Mother Nature Work for You! Let those grass clippings lie - don't bag them. As the clippings decay, they return nutrients to the soil. Or, start a compost pile. You can add your food waste as well and produce a great garden soil conditioner.

Avoid Disposables! Nothing creates waste like one-use items. Buy and use products that are durable and reusable. Think cloth for diapers or wiping up spills rather than paper. Use a coffee mug instead of styrofoam cup. Bring your own reuseable cloth bag to avoid the question, "paper or plastic?" *Note: It takes 75,000 trees each week to produce the Sunday edition of the New York Times. The average American uses 580 pounds of paper each year. As a nation, we consume 850 million trees annually.*

Sprinkling Regulations to Help Conserve Water in Effect May 15 through Sept. 15

To do our part in the conservation of water, residents are required to observe the following sprinkling regulations between the hours of 9:00 a.m. and 9:00 p.m.

--For residents living at odd numbered street addresses, sprinkling is permitted on odd numbered days.

--For residents living at even numbered addresses, sprinkling is allowed on even numbered days.

All residents may sprinkle anytime after 9:00 p.m. and before 9:00 a.m.

EAB Committee Sends Letter to Residents Warning of Signs of Emerald Ash Borer

A special letter from President Fred Gougler and the Emerald Ash Borer (EAB) Committee has been sent to all residents warning of the spread of EAB in Northfield. The borer only attacks ash trees and has been found in 40 ash trees on public rights of way. Infested ash trees are being removed and a grant of \$14,000 received from the Metropolitan Mayors Caucus which comes from the Great Lakes Restoration Initiative will help replace those trees. The letter asks residents to watch for signs of EAB on their property and to take action by either having the tree(s) removed or treated. Northfield Garden Clubs Select Post Office Area for New Design and Landscape Plantings

Members of the Northfielders Garden Club and the Country Gardeners Garden Club are planning a new landscape look for the area in front of the Northfield Post Office. The two garden clubs have been working together to fund the new design and the plantings. This spring they will be removing the declining plant material and incorporating appropriate plans developed by Barbara Berend of the Northfielders Club that take into consideration the scale of the area, low maintenance and salt tolerance due to the proximity of the parking lot. The proposed plantings will add four season color along with a unique Magnolia and an espaliered Scarlet Firethorn. The Garden Clubs continue to plant flowers, flowering bushes and perennials on Village property throughout the community so residents and visitors can enjoy a beautiful downtown throughout the year.

New Economic Development Committee's Goal to Attract Business to the Community

At a strategic planning session held last summer, the Village Board established the goal of creating a new Committee with the mission of attracting new businesses to the Village to increase revenues, diversify the revenue base and create more vibrant downtown and business areas. President Gougler appointed Trustee George Warga to head the new Committee with assistance from Trustee Terry Gottlieb. Other members are still being selected. Once formed, the Committee will focus its efforts on the following goals:

--*Business Attraction.* Identify potential businesses or type of businesses that will benefit Northfield and our existing businesses and work to attract them.

--*Business Retention.* Outreach to the business community to understand what is working well and what could be done better.

--*Business Enhancement.* Encourage reinvestment and site/building enhancement for existing businesses, particularly within the retail sector, but also office buildings and along the Northfield Road corridor.

Northfield Receives \$21,000 FEMA Grant to Recoup Extra Costs of February Blizzard

The Village applied for and will receive a grant of over \$21,000 from the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) for the extraordinary expenses associated with the February blizzard. The grant will help cover unbudgeted overtime expenses, equipment use and material costs including road salt. The Village's part-time administrative intern Mike McIntyre working with Finance Director Steve Noble gathered the necessary information and completed the paper and field work needed to help secure this funding.

Friends of Northfield Foundation Identifies Needs and Uses Donations to Help Many

A valuable but unassuming organization in the community whose sole purpose is to help residents of Northfield is known as the Friends of Northfield Foundation. Founded in 1984, the Foundation acts as a vessel for those who want to give to their community but are not sure where their donation is of most use. The mission of the Foundation is to support grant requests that would enhance the quality of life of Northfield residents and non-profit organizations headquartered in the Village. The Foundation accomplishes this through the generous donations of fellow citizens and other agencies and individuals. One of its important tasks is to act as the fiduciary agent for the Northfield Senior Assistance Fund. Each year, Northfield seniors, sixty years or older who meet certain financial and residency criteria can apply for an annual grant funded through the generosity of residents who recognize the need for support. Grants are made anonymously with assistance from the North Shore Senior Center and each resident's privacy protected. Other grants made from donations to the Foundation have built the fireplace at the Library, provided life-saving defibrillators for the Police and Fire Departments and the Senior Center; helped the Northfield Park District, paid for the new Community Events Sign, provided American and seasonal flags and downtown landscape beautification. With low interest rates, donations are going out but not being renewed for future grants.
