2012-2013 Vehicle Stickers Go on Sale May 14

Applications for FY2012-13 vehicle stickers will be mailed May 11 to all Village residents who purchased stickers last year and whose vehicles are registered to a Northfield address with the Secretary of State. Vehicle stickers and tags go on sale beginning May 14 at the Village Hall, 361 Happ Road, 8:00 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Mon.-Fri. **Stickers must be displayed by July 1, 2012.** Vehicles required to be registered and the appropriate fees for stickers/tags are as follows: Passenger Cars - \$50; Motorcycles - \$35; Recreational Vehicles - \$60; Antique Cars - \$20; Trailers - \$20-\$75; Trucks by class - \$60-\$120; Replacement sticker - \$10. A penalty of 50% of the license fee will be added to the cost of any vehicle sticker purchased after July 1.

Due to a move out of state, Trustee Jack Chapin will leave the Board of Trustees effective May 16. Village President Fred Gougler has recommended the appointment of long time resident Jane Goldenberg to fill the opening on the Board. She will be appointed at the May 15 Board meeting and serve until a Trustee is elected in 2013. Ms. Goldenberg would be eligible to run in the 2013 election.

Board Approves Village Budget of \$15.3 Million for Fiscal Year 2012-2013

The Village Board approved a \$15.3 million budget for FY2012-13 at their April 17 meeting. The operating budget includes revenues and expenditures in the Village's General, Water and Sanitary Sewer Funds with total revenues estimated at \$11.5 million - a decline of 2.4% or \$279,000 compared to the previous budget. The decline in revenue is due to anticipated reductions in fines, telecommunications and property taxes. To offset lower revenues, the Village adopted a 0.75% home rule sales tax effective July 1, 2012 which impacts most tangible items except prescription drugs, food not consumed on the premises and purchase of vehicles. Operating expenditures for FY2012-13 are projected to be \$11.7 million, a decrease of 1.3% compared to last year's budget. It reflects a 1.2% increase in salary expenditures and a 6% decrease in employee benefit costs. All other operating expenses are expected to decrease 2.5%. The projected balance in the General Fund of \$5.1 million on April 30, 2013 meets the Village Board's policy of maintaining at least six months of reserves. Capital expenditures for all funds total \$2.1 million and include \$957,000 for projects related to the Village's water distribution network, \$265,000 in sanitary sewer improvements, \$125,000 for storm sewer projects with the balance for miscellaneous projects and equipment replacement. The Capital budget continues to reflect the Village's efforts to replace aging infrastructure for the safety and well being of residents.

Sanitary Sewer Rate Increase Effective May 1, 2012

As reported in the March-April Northfield News, a 10% sanitary sewer rate increase went into effect May 1. The increase approved by the Board in February, is needed to maintain and update the sanitary sewer system infrastructure. The sanitary sewer rate is now \$1.83 for each 100 cubic feet of water billed, an increase of 17 cents over last year. Since the sewer charge represents only about a quarter of the combined water and sewer rate, the overall increase on a quarterly water/sewer bill is about 2.6%. *To review the complete FY2012-13 Village Budget, visit our website, www.northfieldil.org, and click on Finance Department and Annual Report.*

Idot's Final Willow Road Meeting Gives Residents Chance to Review and Comment on Design Plans

After more than two years of meetings and discussions by Community Advisory Group (CAG) members made up of Northfield, Winnetka, Northbrook and Glenview representatives who worked with IDOT on determining the safest plan for widening Willow Road, the final IDOT public meeting was held Thursday, April 19 at New Trier West High School. The IDOT public meeting provided attendees the opportunity to watch a PowerPoint presentation on the proposed widening plans for the Northfield leg of Willow Road. Residents and those who attended also reviewed proposed design plans and were able to ask questions and provide comments on cards provided by IDOT. Those unable to attend the Open House were given until May 3 to provide written comments and questions on the four lane project. Although Northfield CAG members advocated for a three lane plan, IDOT's proposed final plan is for a four lane road through Northfield. As recommended by the CAG for a safer, wider Willow Road, the proposed plan includes a lower (30 mph) speed limit, narrower 10 ft. lanes, improved pedestrian crosswalks, landscaped medians to maintain the residential character of the community and extensive storm water drainage improvements. As IDOT moves forward, it will complete the planning process and go into final design, engineering and construction phases. Construction work on Willow Road is expected to begin in 2013 and wrap up in mid 2014. Residents will be kept updated via the newsletter and Village website, www.northfieldil.org, as work progresses.

Village Receives Financial Award

The Village of Northfield received recognition from the Government Finance Officers Association (GFOA) which awarded their Certificate of Achievement for Excellence in Financial Reporting to the Village for its comprehensive annual financial report for the fiscal year which ended April 30, 2011. GFOA awards the Certificate to government units and public employee retiree systems whose Comprehensive Annual Financial Reports achieve the highest standards in government accounting and financial reporting. Vehicle Stickers *(Cont'd from Pg. 1)*

For Senior residents (65 years and older) who participate in the State's Circuit Breaker Program requiring an income of less than \$36,635 for couples and \$27,610 for single seniors, one vehicle sticker per household is available at a 50% discount. Northfield stickers are displayed in the lower left hand corner of the front window (driver's side) of each vehicle including passenger vehicles, rv's and trucks. Tags are used for motorcycles and trailers. The Village will use State of Illinois vehicle registration information to ensure compliance. **Avoid a late payment penalty or citation by purchasing a sticker for each vehicle by July 1.**

Public Works Dept. Begins Hydrant Flushing in May

The Village Public Works staff will be opening and flushing hydrants to remove accumulated sediment and improve water flow during the month of May as part of its annual fire hydrant and watermain maintenance program. Hydrant flushing will be done between the hours of 7 a.m. and 5 p.m. and can cause discoloration of water. Residents should run their **cold** water until it is clear. If you have questions or need additional information, contact the Public Works Dept., 847-441-3810 between 8 a.m. and 4 p.m.

One-Time Dog, Cat and Horse Registration Makes Process Easy and Protects Pets

The Village's pet registration program requires owners of dogs and cats that are over six months of age to register them with the Village one time during the life of the pet. Residents can download the form via Internet www.northfieldil.org under Finance, call 847-446-9200, or fax 847-446-4670 to obtain a form from the Village Hall. The completed form along with proof of rabies inoculation for each dog and/or cat and a fee of \$25 per dog/cat can be mailed or brought to the Village Hall, 361 Happ, between 8:00 a.m. and 4:30 p.m. Monday through Friday. A metal I.D. tag with the pet's name, registration number, owner's address and telephone number will be mailed within 2 to 3 weeks. Horses are also required to be registered. The one-time fee is \$25. Registration of dogs and cats aids in their return if lost or stolen. Ask your veterinarian about having your pets "microchipped." Also, to protect your pets, keep cats indoors and all dogs on a leashes. **County and State laws require proof of current rabies shots and a tag for all dogs and cats.**

Replace Worn or Torn Flags and Dispose of Old Flags in the Proper Way

The New Trier Veterans of Foreign Wars has set up local receptacles for the proper disposal of worn or torn American flags. Drop your worn flags into the white receptable outside the Northfield Fire-Rescue Station, 1800 Winnetka Avenue. Collected flags will be properly burned with honor at a VFW ceremony.

Block Parties

To hold a block party, write the Village Manager at least one week prior to the event including the street, date, time, area to be closed and a raindate. Public Works will be notified to deliver barricades a day before the event.

Northfield Board and Staff Continue to Explore Storm Water Ideas and Solutions

The Village Board and staff continue to meet to explore ways to reduce flooding in the community. They are working with IDOT to make sure flood control is integrated into the new Willow Road plans with new storm sewers. They are also working with a group of local residents to host a series of educational sessions to help residents understand options they can implement on their own property to reduce or eliminate flooding. Police Investigate Residential Burglaries in the Village and Offer Tips to Protect Your Property

Two recent burglaries in town have Northfield Police reminding residents not to let your guard down and offering some tips on protecting your property. One of the burglaries involved a home for sale that was being toured by Realtors. After the Open House, it was discovered that jewelry was taken from the home. The theft occurred between 10:00 a.m. and 1:00 p.m. The burglary suspect was described as a white male between 5'9' and 6', 180 lbs with a broad, stocky build, about 40-50 yrs old with short, thinning brown or black hair and was a "smooth talker." He carried an Apple iPad as many Realtors do and used the name of Michael Sherman. Northfield Police are working in conjunction with other Police Departments and Real Estate offices in providing information about this possible suspect. The second burglary was to an unoccupied home under construction. Various fixtures and a new large screen television were taken when the home was entered through an open sliding basement window.

Take Steps to Protect Your Property

To protect your property, the Police Department recommends you take some basic proactive steps:

- Illuminate your home even if it is under construction and use outside light timers and motion sensors in the backyard.
- Communicate with neighbors and watch out for each other.
- Always keep doors and windows locked and make sure contractors are instructed to check before leaving the premises if it is unoccupied during remodeling.
- Secure valuables such as jewelry in a bank safe deposit box.
- Use an alarm system.
- Trim shrubbery that hides doors and windows.
- Do not allow "unexpected" workmen entry into your home and verify identity of all workmen before entry.
- Keep written records of all jewelry, electronic products or other valuables (collections of coins, art, etc.) Take photographs or a video of your valuables and keep serial numbers if possible. This will assist the Police in tracking recovered items as well as serve as a document in an insurance claim. The Northfield Police Dept. also reminds residents that burglars often pose as contractors, surveyors or workmen and park their vehicle nearby. It is important to report any suspicious activity/persons/vehicles immediately by calling

Kraft Chooses to Stay and Grow Grocery Business in Northfield and Other New Businesses Move In

As the Village continues to plan and work toward greater economic development in the community, recent announcements by businesses staying and others choosing Northfield for their growth shows continued improvement in this area. Of course, the major announcement at the end of March was Kraft's decision to keep and expand their North American grocery business in Northfield as a separate company, Kraft Foods Group Inc. While some employees associated with the snacks group will be moving from the headquarters on Three Lakes Drive to a facility in Deerfield, a larger number of employees will be transferred to the Northfield headquarters following the consolidation of various offices across the country. As a result, Kraft Foods is expanding and updating their current facility to accommodate the change. Northfield's Board and staff members are partnering with Kraft's management team to help make the transition and expansion a smooth one. The growth of Kraft impacts shops, restaurants and various service businesses in the community and surrounding areas as well as the potential purchase of homes in Northfield.

Other companies in the process of moving into Northfield include BluePearl Animal Hospital at 820 Frontage Road which is remodeling the former Caledonian site near Tower Road. They will begin construction this summer and hope to open this coming winter. PC Nation, an online electronic and office equipment retailer, is remodeling 500 Central, an office facility that has been vacant for a number of years at the corner of Central and Frontage Roads. They plan to be operational by fall. Finally, the former BP gas station site on the south side of Willow Road east of Bristol Street has been purchased and the new owners have met with the Village's Preliminary Review Committee to discuss plans for a 7,100 sq. ft. shopping center. They plan to submit a Special Use application in the near future with a public hearing to follow. A prime site still available in Northfield is the Hibbard Gardens property on the corner of Winnetka and Hibbard Roads. While there has been some interest in the site, the property has not been purchased nor any plans presented.

Yellow Dot Program Provides Vital Medical Info to First Responders in Emergencies

A new statewide safety program designed to provide vital medical information on the driver of a vehicle and assist first responders who give emergency treatment after an accident has been introduced by the Illinois Dept. of Transportation (IDOT). Named the Yellow Dot Program, participants are asked to place a large yellow decal they receive as part of the kit in the rear window on the drivers side of their vehicle to immediately alert first responders that important contact and medical information is kept in the glove compartment. Village Hosts Document Shredding Event to Coincide with Opening Day of Farmers Market, May 26 from 8:30 AM to 12:30 PM

On the opening day of the Farmers Market, Saturday, May 26, the Village of Northfield in conjunction with Northfield Twp. Road District will hold a "Document Shredding Event" from 8:30 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. at the south end of the parking lot across from New Trier West High School (just north of the Farmers Market). Residents are allowed to bring a maximum of three (3) containers, banker-size boxes, or bags of documents to be shredded and should take their empty containers with them. Residents can view their documents via a monitor on the truck to make sure they are securely shredded.

Recycle Unused/Unwanted items at the Northfield Township Road District Garage Monday-Friday from 7 AM to 3 PM

The Northfield Township Road District is accepting recycled items Mondays through Fridays from 7:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. at the Road District garage, 1928 Lehigh Avenue in Glenview through November 16, 2012. Items accepted include: art supplies, batteries, bikes and toys (in usable condition), cell phones, pagers, clothing (in usable condition), computers and computer hardware, electronics, engine oil, eyeglasses, flags, household paint (oil and latex - limited to 10 1-gallon cans or 2-5-gallon buckets, hydraulic oil, ink/toner cartridges, metal, paper, Styrofoam, televisions, therapeutic equipment including canes, crutches, standers, walkers and wheelchairs, tires, and transmission fluid. The Twp, Road District works with Abt Electronics, St. Philip Lutheran Church, Village Treasure House, The Resale Shop at Glenview Community, OLPH, WINGS Resale Stores, CEDA, the Salvation Army and the City of Chicago/Illinois Environmental Protection Agency (IEPA) to distribute recycled items for reuse. **Items NOT accepted** include household hazardous waste including antifreeze, brake fluid, cleaning products, commercial/industrial waste, drain cleaners, explosives, fertilizers, fire extinguishers, flares, gasoline, landscape waste, lawn chemicals, medical waste, oil mixed with other fluids, pesticides, propane tanks, radioactive material, sharps and/or pharmaceuticals, stains and varnishes with a mineral spirit base, used gas cans or any fluid not in its original container. Electrical Aggregation Being Studied for Potential Savings for Village and Residents

Village Wide Clean-Up Day to Be Held Sat., May 19 - All Items at the Curb by 7 AM

Residents can get rid of old or unused items that cannot be recycled from closets, basements, attics and garages on Saturday, May 19 during the annual Village Wide Clean-Up Day. All items must be put at the curb by 7:00 AM that day for pick up by Waste Management. NO hazardous waste, construction debris, landscape or regular waste or "white goods" (appliances including stoves, refrigerators, washers, dryers, etc.) will be picked up. To arrange for a special pick up of "white goods," call Waste Management, 1-800-796-9696. Abt also recycles old appliances at their recycling center, a free-standing building west of the main Abt store on Milwaukee Avenue in Glenview, from 2:00 to 7:00 p.m. Thursdays through Saturdays. Sprinkling Restrictions in Effect May 15 through Sept. 15 Help Conserve Water

To do our part in the conservation of water, residents are required to observe the following sprinkling regulations between the hours of 9:00 a.m. and 9:00 p.m.

--For residents living at odd numbered street addresses, sprinkling is permitted on odd numbered days.

--For residents living at even numbered addresses, sprinkling is allowed on even numbered days.

All residents may sprinkle anytime after 9:00 p.m. and before 9:00 a.m.

Tracking Water Used for Daily Activities or from Leaks Helps Control Water Bills

Monitoring your water meter and daily use of water can help you determine if you have leaks and can also help you identify ways to save water. Some typical water usage amounts and water wasted from leaks follow:

--clothes washer - 40 gallons per load

--dishwasher - 20 gallons per run

--toilet flush - 2 plus gallons per flush

--showering - 30 plus gallons

--lawn sprinkler - 600 gallons per hour

--sink faucet - 3 gallons per minute

--small 1/16" leak - 800 gallons per day

--large 1/4" leak - 1,000 gallons per day

If you receive an unusually high water bill, a leak in your home or building may be the cause. You may want to check your water meter readings at the same time daily so you can determine the amount of water used during each reading. If you suspect a leak, check the readings before leaving your home and again upon returning. If no water was used during that time but the meter registers otherwise, you might have a leak. Remember some appliances such as an ice maker, water softener and humidifier may use water at any time.
